It became more challenging, having to maintain good grades and stay competitive in soccer. Jake also had to be the man of his house and stay strong for his mother and younger sister.

He finished his high school career with a 4.0 GPA and an acceptance letter to his preferred college. For these reasons, Jake was chosen as the first Titan Echo Senior of the Year.

During his sophomore year, Jake struggled with school. With his dad continuing to fight the disease, grades were not his main focus. But, he passed all his

He participated in community soccer since he was eight years old, which helped him gain experience to play on the varsity team all four years in high school.

Jake has exceptional sportsmanship on and off the field, said his coach, Anthony Coronado.

"He is a natural kind of leader, doesn't complain if he doesn't play, and supports his teammates off the field, very respectful, coachable, and hardworking."

Jake's attitude at home is no different. He does his own laundry, occasionally cooks for his family, maintains the spa, walks the dogs, vacuums, dumps the trash, and drives his younger sister, Megan, to practice when asked.

TITAN TOWN - Sixth period and most of 5th period were a waste on Feb. 26 when a power outage hit Grand Terrace High School, leaving classrooms without computers, lights and air conditioning.

"I almost got trapped in the elevator," said Dominique Gonzales (2014).

The blackout, which began at 12:45 p.m., was caused by a vehicle accident. A truck hit a main electricity pole and damaged it, causing a blackout throughout Grand Terrace and Colton, said Robert Vieags, a public relations spokesman for Southern California Edison.

Mr. Vieagas said the areas affected were between South Center St. and E. Mt.


Vernon Ave., N. Congress St. and W. Grand Terrace Road.

Power was restored by 3 p.m., Mr. Viegas said.

"Repairs were made immediately after," Mr. Viegas told the Titan Echo.

But, confusion followed the blackout as some teachers were told they were on lockdown status. The telephones were inoperable to confirm. Students remained in their 5th period classrooms until dismissal. Afterschool sports and activities were canceled.

Influential Women: COCO CHANEL

PARIS-She was the second daughter of Albert and Jeanne Devolle. As both her parents were absent, the infant's last name was misspelled, due to a clerical error. So, from birth, Gabrielle's name was entered into the official registry as "Chanel."

Gabrielle's father was a street vendor who peddled work clothes and undergarments. Having learned the art of sewing during her six years at Aubazine. Chanel was able to find employment as a seamstress. She began designing hats as a hobby. That

evolved into a big business. She became a licensed milliner/ hat maker. By 1910, she opened her own boutique in Paris called Chanel Modes.

Her early fashions were constructed from humble fabrics such as jersey and tricot, which is primarily used for men's underwear. In 1918, Chanel acquired an entire building at rue Cambon situated in one of the most fashionable districts of Paris. By 1921, she opened what may have been the first boutique that offered clothing, hats and accessories and that later expanded to offer jewelry and perfume.

By 1927, Chanel owned five properties. Businessmen later inaugurated the sale of the now-famous Chanel No. 5 fragrance in department stores. Chanel's goal was to emphasize elegance through her clothing. Her popularity thrived through the 1920s because of her innovative designs. Her look was different.

Today, Chanel's influence goes beyond clothing. She is known for jewelry, handbags, and fragrance. Her signature scent, Chanel No. 5, has become an iconic product on high-end department stores. This story was compiled using various internet sources.

They were contained in the gym however, which was turned into a battlefield by student engineers in the first large robotics competition held here, "Robotic Olympics."


These robots were monsters and slammed into each other and charging aggressors, who were trying to block them from getting the winning shot

Fans yelled and screamed as the robots' screeching nuts and bolts lay everywhere. The pits where the robots were repaired looked like hospitals and triage teams inside performed enormous operations replacing wheels and arms.

The Engineering Club of GTHS spent weeks creating a complex, yet simple robot. The robot's functions

GTHS's own club was on the court, three robots became inoperable and field repairs were made on the spot.

The competition was the school's first as host. Many schools from all over the state came and battled in the gym.

The event hopes to increase appreciation of the wonders of robotics and engineering and how rewarding the lives of robot engineers can be.

The event was so large that the gym and Titan Way were closed from the public and student access.

In addition to the high school competition, elementary students participated in a Lego competition that blew parents away with amazing remote control robots.

Here the children showed their knowledge of programming and imagination by creating scenarios where robots had to clean up a Lego world by pushing ambulances to designated points, then returning to the operator to be given its next task.

The Robotics Competition consisted of 40 different schools, each with a robot to call their own little Terminator. While the robots don't have legs they move fast on little wheels, tracks, or science magic. The robots varied from carriers to attackers but all of them could toss the ball.

Some of the teams had to get creative. For example, one team used pool noodles to act as prongs, and another team seemed to be using a hamper to catch the ball.

Studies: Early School Start Times Harmful

TITAN TOWN -- It seems like every class ple, five schools start later than has at least one student that just can't stay awake or is chronically late to first period.

Titan responses were varied

It's not uncommon to see students resting their heads on desks trying to recover from long nights. With so much time spent trying to juggle studies, sports, and even work, Titans often don't find enough space in their schedules to get the sleep they need.

According to an article on sleep patterns in Psychology Today published in Feb. 2011, teenagers are wired to stay up later and sleep in more than children and adults.

Early school start times actually disrupt this schedule and leave students drowsy for much of the day, according to the article. Adolescents tend to need more rest during school days and take naps in order to compensate for the early hours they must wake at, according to the National Center on Sleep Disorders.

Studies conducted by adolescent sleep expert Dr. Mary Carskadon showed that schools starting in the middle of the morning (during the 9 o'clock hour) have a healthier and more attentive student body. Less behavior problems were reported, grades improved, tardiness decreased, and students took less absent days very soon after switching to later schedules.

"I think school should start earlier than that," said Maxwell Hallwachs (2014).

The 7:25 a.m. start time at GTHS is somewhat early when compared to other schools in the area. For example, five schools start later than GTHS. However, Rubidoux High starts ten minutes earlier.

Titan responses were varied when asked about the 7:25 a.m. start time at GTHS.

"It's five minutes too early, my old school started at 7:30 and that seemed better," said Tatiana Arciniega (2015).

"It's not the best, but I like it better than starting at 8 or 9 and getting out at 3," said Dominique Gonzales (2014). $T\Sigma$




