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Talented & Terrific Singers dominate annual Talent Blast



or the second time in the school's history, one of the Virtual Enterprise teams will compete nationally at the Virtual Enterprise National Business Plan Competition in New York City. Mace Case company will compete at the 2020 Youth Business Summit April 21-23 in New York.

The team earned the spot after placing fifth in the state competition in Bakersfield in March. The other BHS team, Life Cycle, also made it to the finals at the state level placing eighth. The top six California teams are eligible to compete nationally.

"We never thought we'd make it this far, especially New York," said Jazmin Gonzalez, one of the five chiefs of Mace Case.

Beyond the win and opportunity to participate on a national stage, team members say that participating in the competition and in the Business Entrepreneurship pathway has helped them grow as individuals and to gain skills that will help them throughout their lives.

"It helps you to prepare for real-life scenarios," added Samuel Moreno adding that he has developed strong communication skills and learned the importance of staying on task.

The virtual product the Mace Case company came up with is a variety of cases to hold pepper spray containers on cell phones. Although there is not an actual prototype, the team shared designs in their business plan. They also had to include financials, a marketing plan, industry analysis, organization chart, safety and liability information and much more. The idea for the product came from discussions about safety concerns stemming from people focused on their phones and not paying attention to their surroundings.

Juice WRLD dies

On Dec. 8, Rapper Juice WRLD (legal name Jarad A. Higgins), who launched his career on Sound-Cloud died after a "medical emergency" at Chicago's Midway International Airport. At the time of his death, officials said the rapper had experienced cardiac arrest and was transported from the airport's private plane hangar to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead. Juice WRLD was 21.



Rocker Dies

Neil Peart, rock group Rush's legendary drummer and lyricist died after a years-long battle with brain cancer on Jan. 7. He was 67. Peart received numerous awards for his musical performances, including an induction into the Modern Drummer Readers Poll Hall of Fame in 1983, making him the youngest person ever so honored.

Golden Globes

The 77th annual Golden Globe Awards took place on Jan. 5 at the Beverly Hilton in Los Angeles. Ricky Gervais hosted for the third time.

Tom Hanks received the honorary Cecil B. Demille Award, while Ellen Degeneres picked up the Carol Burnett Award. The film Once Upon a Time in Hollywood, directed and written by Quentin Tarantino, won three of the five awards for which it was nominated. The Farewell star Awk-



wafina became the first actress of Asian descent ever to win Best Actress in a Musical or Comedy. Joaquin Phoenix won Best Actor in a Motion Picture-Drama. for Joker.

Duke and Duchess of Sussex



On Jan. 8, Duke and Duchess of Sussex announced they are stepping back as "senior" royals and will work towards becoming financially independent. On Jan. 18, they announced that they will surrender their "royal highness" titles and repay the funds spent on renovating their home near Windsor Castle. They also said they plan to split their time between

the UK and North America. Just before the coronavirus hit, they relocated to LA to be closer to her work and her mother.

Delta Under Investigation

On Jan. 15, Delta Airlines dumped over 15,000 gallons of jet fuel during its flight to LAX. A Delta spokesperson said only that the pilots were forced to dump fuel over an urban area to reduce the plane's weight before the return landing. The fuel was dropped near schools, causing 60 students elementary to

high school, to be taken to the hospital.

Mary Higgins Clark

The best-selling suspense novelist died of natural causes in Naples, Florida, on Jan. 31 at the age of 92. Clark wrote more than 40 books

during her long career, selling more than 100 million copies in the U.S. alone. In 2000, the mother of five signed a \$64 million contract for her next five books, making her the highest-paid female author in the world at the time.

Math genius dies

Katherine Johnson, the famed mathematician, who was among



the trailblazing black women to help pave the way for the United States' space travel, passed away at age 101 on Feb. 24. Johnson was the inspiration behind the 2016 film Hidden Figures, in which Taraji P. Henson starred. She received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015, the highest civilian honor the US gives. During her 35-year career at NASA and its predecessor,

she earned a reputation for mastering complex manual calculations and helped pioneer the use of computers to perform the tasks.

62nd Grammy Awards

The 62nd annual Grammy Awards ceremony was held on Jan. 26, at the Staples Center in Los Angeles and was hosted by Alicia Keys. Performers at the Staples Center took the stage below the retired jerseys of Kobe Bryant, who was killed in a helicopter crash earlier that day. The night also included triumphs for first-time Grammy winners like Lizzo, who kicked off the show with a jubilant performance, and Billie Eilish, who swept the big four categories for the first time since Christopher Cross in 1981.

Superbowl

On Feb. 2, the 54th annual Super Bowl took place at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fl. The halftime show was headlined by Jennifer Lopez and Shakira. The Kansas City Chiefs took the win against the San Francisco 49ers, 31-20. This was the Chiefs' first victory in 50 years. Quarterback Patrick Mahomes was named the MVP.



Hollywood icon dies

Kirk Douglas, the Hollywood icon died on Feb. 5. He was 103. The Spartacus acting legend, who had suffered a stroke in 1996 but managed to go back to acting despite a distinct slur to his speech, is survived by his wife of 65 years, Anne. Douglas also has a famous acting son, Michael Douglas. The elder Douglas was known for his charitable works, including donating millions of dollars to improving playgrounds in public schools around the LA area.



The 92nd Academy Awards

On Feb. 9 The 92nd Academy Awards ceremony, presented by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, honored the best films

of 2019 and took place at the Dolby Theatre in Hollywood, Los Angeles, California. Parasite was the breakout star of this year's Oscars by breaking barriers: the film became the first non-English movie to win best picture. Billie Eilish performed the Beatles' Yesterday for the in memoriam, which honored those who died in the film industry in the



last year. Brad Pitt won his first Oscar for acting, picking up the best supporting actor Academy Award for his work in Quentin Tarantino's film, Once Upon a Time... in Hollywood.

Mrs. Rosa Aguirre's Pineapple Pie Receipe

Ingredients

1 pastry shell for a 9-inch double crust pie

Or buy 1 Pillsbury pie crust and thaw out while you prepare the filling

½ C. white sugar

3 Tbsp. cornstarch

1 (20 oz) can crushed pineapple with juice (Mrs. Aguirre recommends 2 for more filling)

2 Tbsp. Lemon juice (Fresh or Bottled)

1 Tbsp. Milk

1 Tbsp. White Sugar

Directions

*If you use 2 cans of pineapple, buy one crushed and one chunky and one dice to get some bigger bits. Mrs. Aguirre usually cuts it into 4 parts. Follow the recipe below.

Preheat the oven to 425 degree F (220 degrees C)

In a medium saucepan combine sugar, cornstarch, pineapple with juice, and lemon juice, and lemon juice. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened, then allow to boil for 1 minute.

Cool slightly and pour mixture into pastry-lined pie pan. Cover with top crust and seal. Make a few steam vents in preheated oven and bake for 35 minutes.

Served chilled or at room temperature.
