Saturday, April 29 is the date the Dr. Paul J. Rogers new elementary school will be officially dedicated, hence the

begin promptly at 2 p.m. at the new facility, 955 W. Laurel. The ceremony follows a noon time luncheon, honoring Dr. Rogers. This will be held in the Colton Junior High School cafetorium.
